MILESTONE CHECKLIST

MILESTONE CHECKLIST

TALKING ABOUT DEVELOPMENT AND MILESTONES CAN MAKE YOU HEART RACE. I KNOW WHAT IT'S LIKE TO BE CONCERNED THAT YOUR BABY IS NOT HITTING MILESTONES ON TIME. I ALSO KNOW WHAT IT'S LIKE TO SEEK HELP EARLY AND WATCH A BABY CATCH UP.

WE KNOW THAT UP TO 50% OF BABIES WHO ARE SUSPECTED OR KNOWN TO HAVE A DEVELOPMENTAL DELAY DO NOT CATCH UP WITHOUT EARLY INTERVENTION. SO, IF WE CAN IDENTIFY THAT A LITTLE ONE NEEDS SOME HELP, WE SHOULD GET THEM THAT HELP!

MILESTONES ARE NOT MEANT TO BE SCARY, THEY ARE MEANT TO EDUCATE AND EMPOWER. WHEN WE KNOW BETTER, WE CAN DO BETTER. USE THESE CHECKLISTS TO "CHECK AND SEE" WHERE YOUR LITTLE ONE IS, SO YOU CAN BEST SUPPORT THEM AS THEY LEARN AND GROW!



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\bigcirc	Smiles purposefully in response to caregiver. Initiates smiles and returns them
	Looks to make eye contact with caregiver. e.g., You say, "Hi, baby!" they say a sound or coo back.
\bigcirc	Shows an interest in people more than objects and looks to interact with them.
\bigcirc	Responds and attempts to imitate facial expressions. e.g., Blowing raspberries, sticking out tongue.
\bigcirc	Vocalizes and coos when caregiver talks to baby. e.g., "ga," vowel sounds, sounds made in back of throat.



\bigcirc	Enjoys social games and playful interactions with the caregiver. e.g Looks in anticipation of Peek-a-boo.
\bigcirc	Takes turns vocalizing. e.g You say "Hi, baby!" They say a sound or coo back.
\bigcirc	Turns toward someone talking to them and looks for people talking in the room
	Produces coos, vowel sounds, yells, squeals, and shrieks. Yay for our ear drums!
\bigcirc	Produces Consonant-Vowel (CV) syllable shapes with /p, b, m/ sounds spontaneously. e.g., "ba, ma, pa"



\bigcirc	Produces/imitates reduplicated babbles and oral sounds like raspberries. "ba ba ba, ma ma ma".
\bigcirc	Understands a few routine words and phrases. You say "time for bath," baby looks in anticipation.
\bigcirc	Imitates some simple actions. Shaking a rattle, or you pet the stuffed doggy and say "pet pet," they imitate the action of petting.
\bigcirc	Child shifts attention between an activity/item and caregiver to share in that activity. Baby looks at you and the train while playing.
\bigcirc	Responds to name by looking/vocalizing.
\bigcirc	Communicates with vocalizations, eye contact, and some early gestures. Baby reaches for items, pushes things away.



	Babbles with a variety of consonant and vowel sounds. "ga, ma, ba, da"
\bigcirc	Produces early gestures like waving, clapping, and pointing.
\bigcirc	Understands about 50 words and familiar phrases.
\bigcirc	Imitates simple actions. Stomping feet, turning pages, putting items in a basket.
\bigcirc	Follows along with routines and nursery songs.
	Says one true word by end of 12 months. Examples: "Ba" for ball "Mama" "Da" for dog "Hi"



\bigcirc	Says 5-10 words/word approximations. "Ba" for ball counts!
\bigcirc	Babbles in sentence-like strands with adult intonation. "baa goo gah ma!"
	Uses 10 or more gestures independently. Waves, points, claps, reaches to be picked up, smacks lips to eat.
\bigcirc	Frequently imitates sounds in play. Moo, urrm, aww, choo choo!
\bigcirc	Uses gestures, signs, and verbal communication for a variety of social interactions. Greets others, makes requests, labels, protests.
	Follows one-step directions with adult help & prompts. Ex: "give it to me," "come here"



\bigcirc	Says 10–50 words. 10 being the minimum (90% of kids) and 50 being the average (50% of kids)
\bigcirc	Speech is ~ 25% intelligible. You understand them about a quarter of the time.
	Imitates simple words frequently and learns new words daily/weekly. Ex: ball, mama, dada, up. boo!
\bigcirc	Points to identify common vocabulary including body parts.
\bigcirc	Follows one-step directions independently. Ex: "Go get me a diaper please!"
\bigcirc	Follows two-step directions with models and prompts Ex: "Pick it up and put it in the basket!"



\bigcirc	Takes turns during conversations and engages in adult-like dialogue. Vocalizations are mixed with words to create utterances.
\bigcirc	Tries to assist with taking off and putting on clothing.
\bigcirc	Imitates housework activities and uses objects together in play.
\bigcirc	Identifies a handful of body parts and clothing items on self.
\bigcirc	Understands many action words. "Sit down, come here, kick the ball"
	Imitates two-word phrases and uses single words frequently.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU NOTICE YOUR LITTLE ONE IS NOT DOING SOMETHING ON THE CHECKLIST:



TRY AT HOME FIRST

EXPOSE YOUR LITTLE ONE TO WHAT THEY ARE MISSING AND SEE IF THEY CAN LEARN IT. IF YOU HAVEN'T EXPOSED THEM TO IT, THEY LIKELY WON'T BE ABLE TO DO IT!



CONTACT A PROFESSIONAL

IF YOU'VE TRIED TO MODEL THE CONCEPTS OR PROMPT YOUR LITTLE ONE TO ENGAGE IN THE ACTIVITIES LISTED AND YOU ARE STILL CONCERNED, TALK TO A PROFESSIONAL AND CONTACT YOUR LOCAL EARLY INTERVENTION.
